A Message from our President Byron Dresner

It has been a long time since we were able to see each other. I have missed the shul and the services we used to attend every Shabbat followed by the delicious Kiddushes prepared by our incomparable MATILDA. Our Rabbi has on an almost daily basis continued providing us with various posts through social media as well as two classes each week. Many of us have kept in touch with each other through telephone calls and emails. The services on Zoom which are being conducted on each Shabbat led by our Rabbi and Cantor have to some extent substituted for the regular Shabbat services we stopped having in March of this year, We have been disappointed that most of our members have not availed themselves of the Zoom services. We hope that you will continue to strive to join us on Zoom. We understand that many of you are not computer literate but are trying to catch up with this new computer world we live in.

Our main problem has been to resolve how we will be able to conduct services on the coming High Holidays. We know and understand that most of us will be reluctant to attend services in person for fear of becoming infected with the corona virus and because of our infirmities the unlikely ability to recover

from it. Accordingly, we have been wrestling with coming up with a system which will enable us to attend services by viewing them from our computers. So far the most likely system we will use is Zoom which unfortunately means that most of our members will not be able to view the holiday services. This is why we have been trying so much to get our members to learn how to utilize Zoom which we have been using for Shabbat services.

However we are working on a plan to have the Zoom services emanate from the Shul and also permit a limited amount of members to be present in the Shul at the same time under certain conditions. We shall keep you informed through our mail and email.

In the meantime stay healthy and safe.

The Jewish Theological Seminary (Manhattan), Ziegler School of Rabbinic Studies (Los Angeles), Schechter Institute of Jewish Studies (Jerusalem), Seminario Rabbinic Latino Americano (Buenos Aires) and Zacharias Frankel College (Potsdam, Germany).

In addition, there are Mazal Tov cards, Get Well cards, Good Luck cards for your new baby, assorted Sympathy cards, Thank You cards, and Friendship cards. Remembering the RABINOWITZ FAMILY - by Byron Dresner

The death of Stanley Rabinowitz on July 7, 2020, brought to our memory the impact of his parents Solomon and Clara Rabinowitz who were considered the founders of Flushing Jewish Center. The Flushing Jewish Center according to the archives was organized in 1932. Old records show Solomon Rabinowitz as president in its early days. During the existence of the Flushing Jewish Center, Sol and his wife Clara were integral in the affairs of the center, contributing financial assistance and leadership. They sponsored many kiddushes and dinners for the members. Obtained many Ads for our annual Journals. Sol served Sunday morning breakfasts after services. Clara served as president of the sisterhood for many years. They celebrated all of their family simchas with the congregation and were involved in all facets of the congregation. They assisted members who had financial problems. Sol even assisted a local non Jewish retailer whose child needed surgery by paying the fee of the surgeon. Through their efforts the Hebrew School Building was erected and bore their names.

Stanley Rabinowitz was their youngest of four sons but the apple of their eye. Born in 1933. He attended the Shul's Hebrew School, graduated and was Bar Mitzvah in the Flushing Jewish Center. He married Iris and had three children, Suzanne, Jeffrey and Larry. Larry unfortunately predeceased him but prior to his death lived in his grandparents home in Flushing and attended services in the morning minyan. Stanley eventually succeeded his father as President in the family lighting business. and was instrumental at the time of the merger of the Flushing Jewish Center and the Fresh Meadows Jewish Center in creating the Rabinowitz Memorial Fund by purchasing an Israeli Bond, the earnings to be used for charitable purposes.

My dear friends, when we gathered together for the High Holidays last year, there is no way any of us could have predicted the events of 2020. The idea that we would be separated by this awful disease and only be able to meet over computer, the idea that our High Holiday services this year would be done by Zoom, was so far beyond our ability to conceive that had someone said it was going to be happen, they probably would have been dismissed as a joker.

And yet, here we are. Together, but not together. United, but apart.

This year, more than ever, when we read the psalm for the season, Psalm 27, the final words have a greater impact than ever before: I have faith that I shall surely see the Lord's goodness in the land of the living. Hope in the Lord, be strong, take courage and hope in the Lord."

When reading those words, let us be reminded that even with everything that has happened in the last year, there are still many reasons to be strong, take courage, and hope in the Lord. Firstly, we are here. We might not be physically together, we might not be able to sit with our friends at synagogue and celebrate the new year the way we are use to, but we are here, we will be united through Zoom, and the High Holidays WILL happen and we will celebrate the new year together.
