A Wonderful Tu Beshvat At FFMJC by Rabbi Dan Wolpe

On Monday, February 10, The Flushing Fresh Meadows Jewish Center hosted a Tu Beshvat Seder. The Tu Beshvat Seder is a tradition that goes back 500 years and it celebrates the beauty of God's creation. Tu Beshvat is often called "The new year of the trees," and is a minor holiday which is basically the Jewish Arbor Day. It is a celebration of nature and is celebrated in many different ways. The name Tu Beshvat literally means, "The 15th day of the month of Shevat." In Israel, it is customary to plant trees on this day in honor of it being the New Year of the Trees.

In the Talmud, Tu Beshvat is listed as one of four New Years in our calendar. The first of Nisan which is the new year in the Torah, the rabbis declared to be the "New year for kings and festivals." The first of Elul is the new year for tithes and cattle, the first of Tishrei is Rosh HaShannah, and is the date by which the calendar is counted and celebrates the creation of the world, and Tu Beshvat was ruled to be the date by which the agricultural calendar began.

In the 16th century, the mystics of Tzfat instituted the Tu Beshvat seder. This seder gave symbolic meaning to various fruits in Israel. Although much shorter than the Passover seder, it does include four cups of wine. However, whereas one is supposed to drink red wine on Passover, the Tu Beshvat seder switches between white and red, and even has a cup where the two are supposed to be mixed! Different fruits and nuts are also eaten throughout the seder.

In the Torah, we are commanded to take care of the Earth. Sadly, it is a commandment we have not fulfilled to the best of our ability. Tu Beshvat is a reminder of this holy responsibility, and it signals a need that is truer now than it has ever been before.


